
Scraping, sanding or removing old paint?

How can we make sure we're safe?

- · If paintwork is in good condition; sugar soap, rinse; and overcoat with modern paint.
- · If not, remove furniture and carpets or cover them completely.
- · Shut off the work area, keep others out, especially children or pregnant women.
- Wear protective clothes, gloves and an EN143 P2 face mask.
- · Use methods that don't create dust or fumes. Don't dry sand.
- Keep surfaces moist when removing paint.
- After paint removal, moisten and smooth with a water-proof abrasive paper.
- Put the removed paint and dust in a safe container a sealed plastic bag will do.
- · When you break from the work, store your clothes in a sealed plastic bag.
- · Wash your hands and any other bare skin before you do anything else.
- · Thoroughly clean the room and any coverings with a solution of dishwasher detergent.
- To get rid of any dust use an industrial standard vacuum cleaner (BS5415).
- · Wash the clothes you've been working in separately from any others.
