## LEAD POISONING

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
Benjamin Vaughan

Philada, July 31, 1786.

This, my dear friend, is all I can at present recollect on the subject. You will see by it, that the opinion of this mischievous effect from lead is at least above sixty years old; and you will observe with concern how long a useful truth may be known and exist, before it is generally receiv'd and practis'd on.

> I am, ever, yours most effectionately, B. FRANKLIN.

You will see that Franklin was referring to an opinion expressed 60 years previously, in 1726. Today, nearly 300 years later, we are still dealing with lead poisoning.

Here Franklin was referring to the printing press and asserting that the written word is all conquering.
